Course Description	Globalization, War, and the Economy explores international relations in the context of globalization. In this course, we ask the following questions: What is globalization and how does it affect the world? Does globalization increase or decrease international conflict? What is the effects of globalization on the economy? Do trade and increased international interactions help international peace and stability or do they make the world more vulnerable because of international interdependence? After completing this course, students will have a better understanding of the current world and the impact of globalization.

Research Paper Guidelines	Your paper must be at least 1,200 words EXCLUDING title page, footnotes/endnotes and references. 1. You MUST have a clearly defined and narrowly focused research question. I suggest you develop a research question in a literally question form. For instance, does globalization help democratization in the world? 2. In the introduction, you introduce the research question and describe why the question is meaningful/interesting. At the beginning of the body of the paper, you provide background information. If it is a case study or analytical paper, you provide historical information so that the reader can understand the background. If it is a theoretical paper, you provide a literature review on the subject. 3. In the main body of the paper, you provide your answer to the research question. You MUST provide evidence to back up your argument/answer to the research question. 4. In the conclusion, you summarize what you did in the paper and discuss your findings in the context of the literature in the field and implications of your findings.
Presentation of Research Paper	Students are required to present his/her paper to the class.
