Guidelines	Roman with 12-point font size and 1-inch margin). You MUST have at least FIVE references. 1. You MUST have a clearly and narrowly defined question. I suggest you develop a research question in a literally question form. For instance, does globalization helps democratization in the world? 2. In the introduction, you introduce the research question and describe why the question is meaningful/interesting. At the beginning of the body, you provide background information. If it is a case study or analytical paper, you provide historical information so that the reader can understand the background. If it is a theoretical paper, you provide a literature review on the subject. 3. In the main body of the paper, you provide your answer to the research question. You MUST provide evidence to back up your argument/answer to the research question. 4. In the conclusion, you summarize what you did in the paper and discuss your findings in the context of the literature in the field and implications of your study.
