□ Course Information

Course Description	<p><i>Europe and Asia</i> analyses the relationship between these two cornerstones of the international system. The relationship between the EU and Asia is one of the key drivers of 21st century international relations and political economy. While in the past relations between the two of them were driven by economics, today political and security calculations are also central to understand the dynamics behind their interactions. Meanwhile, in recent years NATO has strengthen its relationship with selected Asian countries. Furthermore, Asian leaders have recently started to consider European integration and diplomatic experiences as potential models for regional integration. This course addresses the relationship between Europe and Asia by looking at their relations at the bilateral, inter-regional and global levels. Particular attention will be given to how developments in the international system affect EU-Asia interactions, as well as to how these interactions impact international relations and the international political economy. Special emphasis will also be made on the role of the US and other powers in shaping the EU’s and key Asian countries’ respective policies towards each other. Attention will also be given to growing NATO-Asia links, as well as to how Europe’s experience can foster Asian cooperation. Sessions will build on key selected readings, policy documents, and International Relations and Political Economy concepts.</p>
